SWAT UPDATE



With funds from a Homeland Security Program Grant, the Queen Anne's County Office of the Sheriff has acquired a 2013 Freightliner Sprinter 3500 box van. The new vehicle will be used for SWAT Operations and as an Incident Command Vehi-

Since 1996 the SWAT team utilized a Ford E-350 van which has become too small for the personnel and assorted equipment. In addition to being much larger, the new Freightliner also has opening sliding doors on each side which will allow team members to disembark quicker and safer on operations.

In 2001 the Kent Island Fire Department donated a retired 1996 Ford box ambulance to the Sheriff's Office which was converted into an Incident Command Vehicle. After much use, a replacement vehicle was needed due to the high mileage, several expensive mechanical issues and limited capabilities.

The new Freightliner Sprinter was up-fitted by a local company, Incident Communications Solutions, Inc. of Stevensville, Maryland

Business Liaison

Sheriff Hofmann has named Sgt. Stephen Stouffer as the Business Liaison for the Office of the Sheriff. Sgt. Stouffer is responsible for handling major business thefts within the community. Sgt Stouffer, previously assigned to the Criminal Investigations Unit, will be the point of contact for businesses within Queen Anne's County having concerns of major theft or other criminal activity affecting their businesses.

Businesses from 1 employee to hundreds, it is incumbent amongst all employer's to educate your staff.

My deputies will be increasing patrols in within the business community to raise awareness to safety. I am asking that you have your staff call in anyone whom is suspicious or committing a crime immediately, and make contact with the deputy to let them know what you observed. Your safety should always be first, don't confront suspects, but be a trained observer, and report the incident.

The Queen Anne County Office of the Sheriff Field Operation Division for the first 8 months 2013 has handled 17,136 incidents which resulted in 1,214 initial investigative reports and 970 supplemental reports. Made 312 on-view arrests and completed 173 applications for charges as a result of a criminal investigation. Field Operation Division also served 403 arrest warrants, 71 criminal summonses, and served 2,263 civil process papers. Issued a total of 4,842 traffic citations, warnings, equipment repair orders, and parking citations. Also the Field Operation Division issued 21 civil citations for various civil violations, such as underage possession of alcohol and tobacco.







Fingerprinting Services

Critical Update on our Fingerprint Services

As of September 20, 2012 the FBI will no longer be accepting inked fingerprint cards. All fingerprints should be electronically or digitally captured and are to be electronically submitted to The Maryland Criminal Justice Information System-Central Repository (CJIS).

Our office is pleased to announce that we will be able to comply with the NEW 'Electronic-Only Processing' policy that has been put in effect by the FBI. With the new FBI policy several changes are being made to our current fingerprint procedures.

- Our office will be fingerprinting Monday-Friday from 8a.m. to 8p.m. and there will be a \$20.00 fingerprint fee {with no card limit}.
- You will need to bring the Background Check form printed by your employer with your fingerprint Authorization Code on it.
- The Associated CJIS -CR Fees are:

Full Background (State & Federal) for authorized agencies only \$34.50

Child Care Volunteers \$33.00

State background check only \$18.00

With gold seal \$19.00 Attorney/Client Civil \$18.00

- * These fees can also be found at www.dpscs.state.md.us under short link background check*
- You will need to also bring a **Photo ID** and a **Check or Money Order ONLY** made out to *Queen Anne's County Office of the Sheriff* for your payment. Be sure your payment include the \$20.00 fingerprint fee & the associated CJIS-CR Fees. (Fingerprint Fees are mandated by the State & Federal Government)

George was born and raised in Queen Anne's County, where he continues to live today. George graduated from Queen Anne's County High School in 1985. George says "I enjoy serving as the SRO of the Queen Anne's County High School because my career has taught me that the education and familiarization of law enforcement starts with our kids. It is important to get to know the kids and the young adults of our community and answer the many questions that they have to ask. Furthermore, there is nothing more important than the safety of these young adults and the staff that teaches them."

How do I get a copy of a Police Report?

Police reports are not automatically sent by our office you must request them in writing. We search police reports by case #, date or location. All reports are reviewed by the Lt. and must be closed before being mailed. This process may take 7-10 business days.
