The Queen Anne's County Drug Task Force is a multi-agency task force aimed at combating mid and upper level drug dealers in Queen Anne's County, Maryland. The task force board is comprised of members of the Maryland State Police, Queen Anne's County Sheriff's Office, the Centreville Police Department, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources Police and the Office of the Queen Anne's County State's Attorney.

The Queen Anne's County Drug Task Force reports quarterly to the Task Force Advisory Board. The benefit of the Task Force concept is that it lessens the manpower and budgetary constraints on each participating agency.

The investigative case load carried by the task force grows every year and many of the crimes investigated have roots or ties in other counties and/or states. Investigators at the task force routinely work closely with the FBI, DEA, HSI, the ATF, neighboring drug task forces and state and federal prosecutors to bring these cases to a successful conclusion and to ensure that all persons involved with the drug/criminal networks are brought to justice, no matter where they live.

Investigators with the task force also routinely work hand in hand with the CID units at the Centreville Barrack and the Queen Anne's County Sheriff's Office to investigate thefts, robberies and crimes of violence that often have their roots in the use and sales of narcotics.

The Queen Anne's County Drug Task Force is a financially self-sufficient unit, operating off of seized assets at no cost to the taxpayers of Queen Anne's County. Besides using seized, drug related funds to pay for day to day operational expenses, the task force routinely pays for training, equipment and other related costs occurred by member agencies.

SHERIFF'S RESOURCE UNIT UPDATE

The Sheriff's Resource Unit is tasked with providing security at 12 of the county's 14 schools. The unit is comprised of a Sergeant, Corporal, and four School Resource Deputies. Two of the four School Resource Deputies are assigned to high schools while the other two are assigned to elementary and middle schools. In addition to protecting the county's schools on a daily basis, the unit is responsible for agency's marine unit, auxiliary unit, and handling special events throughout the county. The vast majority of the special events in the county are held on the weekends, which causes the members of the unit to often work long stretches of days to provide coverage at the schools during the week and events on the weekends.

In July 2017 the unit had a change of leadership; Corporal John Brockman was transferred into the unit as 2nd in Command to manage its operations. With the change of leadership and some restructuring, came different areas of focus and changes in enforcement strategies. In previous years the unit was involved in several special enforcement initiatives outside the realm of school security or special events; in 2017 the unit discontinued the special enforcement initiatives to focus primarily on the schools and events. This was still accomplished while losing personnel to retirement and resignations.

The structured changes of the unit's enforcement strategies and areas of focus yielded excellent results. During this calendar year, in addition to school safety as well as criminal and traffic enforcement, The unit was tasked with working 319

special events and over 100 school related events. Additionally the unit attended over 65 meetings, taught over 55 character counts classes, and attended over 80 days of training.

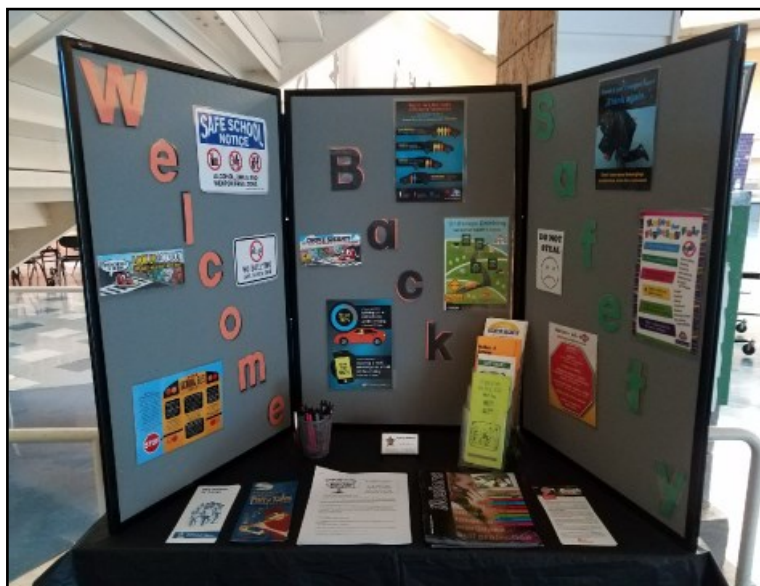
During this period unannounced K9 Scans of schools were conducted, which resulted in several students being charged with Controlled Dangerous Substance violations which were located on school property. This solidified that the zero tolerance enforcement efforts of the School Resource Deputies were being noticed among the students and curbed destructive behavior.

During this period the Auxiliary Volunteer Deputy Program was also slightly restructured. The restructuring changed the leadership roles among the members and several policies. Up to this point the Auxiliary Unit has eleven active members, who assist with a variety of tasks as directed by SRU Supervisors. The dedicated members of this unit combined for more than 2,000 hours of volunteer service. A new Auxiliary Deputy Training Program will be implemented in 2018 to provide much needed essential training for these volunteers to perform the tasks at hand.

School Resource Deputies sets up monthly informational display boards in each of their High School's cafeteria during lunch shifts that have topics directly associated with crime prevention. The displays are tailored to youth crime prevention through positive decision making. School Resource Deputies works closely with the students of their schools to

provide information that is appropriate with current trends the students are experiencing. Some of their monthly topics include safe dating to include date rape prevention, anti-bullying, anti-drug, safe holiday shopping, and suicide prevention.

Special recognition for the Resource Unit was received during this timeframe. Dfc. Jennifer Aaron was awarded much deserved recognition from the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention for her outstanding efforts in Crime Prevention. Dfc. Aaron does a remarkable job in creating message boards and presentations for the students at the Kent Island High School. She is extremely passionate for the safety of the students under her care. Outstanding achievement!



In addition, the entire Resource Unit was recognized with a Crime Prevention Award from the American Society for Industrial Security for their efforts in school safety and criminal enforcement. The entire unit works every day to preserve order and protect life / property to provide a safe and secure environment for faculty, staff, and students at all Queen Anne's County Public Schools. Excellent work!

Sheriff's Office announces new cadet program

January 16, 2018 Queen Anne's County Sheriff Gary Hofmann announced the creation of the Queen Anne's County Sheriff Cadet Program. The main objective of this new program within the Queen Anne's County Office of the Sheriff is to expose those recently graduated from or close to graduating from high school the opportunity to work in law enforcement before they enter the police academy at age 20 or 21.

"This Cadet program is something I am very excited about for the young adults of Queen Anne's County who aspire to have a career in law enforcement as a police officer. I strongly believe this will give those young adults a real and meaningful experience to be prepared for the police academy when that time comes for them. Not only that, they will offer invaluable assistance to my agency and the Deputies that serve our community" said Sheriff Gary Hofmann.

The Queen Anne's County Office of the Sheriff Cadet Program is a law enforcement apprenticeship program that will offer training and varied work assignments for persons between the ages of 18 and 21.

The Cadet Program provides qualified men and women the chance to experience the challenges and personal rewards of a police career. Office of the Sheriff Cadets will earn an annual salary of \$27,040 and be considered full time employees

"The new Cadet Program exemplifies the strong partnership between the Queen Anne's County Sheriff's Office and Queen Anne's County Public Schools. This program will afford our students and graduates the opportunity to establish a career in law enforcement, continue their post-secondary learning, and help to fulfill a workforce need right here in Queen Anne's County." said Dr. Andrea Kane, Superintendent of Queen Anne's County Public Schools. "My thanks go out to Sheriff Hofmann for his leadership in creating a win-win opportunity for the students and community of Queen Anne's County!"

Members of the Cadet Program will be tasked with a variety of duties to provide exposure to the many aspects of law enforcement including processing arrested individuals, fingerprinting, data entry, locating and verifying court paperwork such

as warrants and summonses, responding to public inquiries, assisting the Duty Officer and Command Staff as needed, along with other duties as assigned. Cadets must successfully complete all the Deputy Sheriff entry level testing procedures during their employment, and will be required to further their education by taking and passing college level courses for credit.

"We are pleased to support the new cadet program in the Queen Anne's County Sheriff's Office." said Stuart M. Bounds, Interim President of Chesapeake College. "Chesapeake's Criminal Justice Program provides the ideal preparation for the QAC cadets to begin their careers in law enforcement here on the Eastern Shore. We look forward to working with Sheriff Hofmann to aid development of new law enforcement professionals in Queen Anne's County."

Anyone wishing to apply for a Cadet Corps position should visit www.qac.org and click on employment to apply. Applicants can be 17 at time of application, but must be 18 at time of hire.

PROPERTY AND EVIDENCE

The Property and Evidence Section is supervised by Evidence Manager McCarthy, who has the responsibility for the control and accountability of all items submitted for safekeeping, analysis, or evidence. During 2017, there were on average three thousand eight hundred (3,800) pieces of evidence or property held within the various storage areas of the Property and Evidence Section. Those items included seized currency, illegal drugs, jewelry, firearms, trace evidence, and many other types. During 2017, four hundred twenty three (423) items of evidence were purged, destroyed, or disposed of, as they were no longer needed for prosecution, or no longer of evidentiary value.

Twelve (12) firearms releases were conducted in 2017, with a total of forty five (45) firearms released to their owner. Those

firearms were seized as evidence, seized pursuant to a civil order, recovered as found property, or recovered as stolen property.

During 2017, the Sheriff's Office continued collecting unwanted prescription medications from the public. One hundred fourteen (114) pounds of prescription medications were collected during various initiatives, or dropped off at the Sheriff's Office by the public.

This year, used or unwanted syringes were also collected and disposed of, free of charge.

Evidence inventory of specific storage locations was conducted each month with a 100% accountability for all stored property. An annual independent audit of all property by the Administrative Services Commander was also conducted with 100% accountability.

Patrol Deputies handle over 4,000 calls in just 12 weeks

The Office of the Sheriff for Queen Anne's County provides Prompt, professional, and courteous service to the citizens of the County. The Patrol Unit is the largest Unit within the Agency. The Deputies that are assigned to this unit are scheduled to serve the County twenty-four hours daily and seven days a week. This includes weekends and holidays. This unit is made up of extremely professional police officers that strive to protect your communities day and night. This unit is unique and it is mission oriented. The Unit conducts various different calls of service to include traffic enforcement, drug enforcement, criminal investigations, and much more. The following is a list of activities that the Sheriff's Patrol unit has accomplished since January 1, 2018.

Patrol Deputies completed a total of 4,554 calls for service to include traffic stops. These Deputies completed a total of 283 reports for multiple types of offenses. Sheriff's Patrol Deputies have completed 165 Radar assignments, 76 traffic

enforcement, and totaling 1,600 traffic stops. Patrol Deputies have investigated 54 motor vehicle collisions on our County roadways. Speed is perhaps one of the Counties number one complaints and Patrol is active in assisting to resolve these complaints.

Over the past year, drug usage has risen to higher levels to include the use of Heroin combined with Fentanyl. This deadly combination has caused our Patrol Units to respond to numerous overdoses and in some cases, fatalities are the result. The Office of the Sheriff has trained and supplied our Patrol Units with the lifesaving drug called Narcan. This drug is administered through the nasal area and is used to counteract the effects of an overdose. This drug has assisted our deputies with saving lives of people that are struggling with the opioid addiction. Patrol Deputies have investigated 40 cases that resulted in one or more persons being charged with possession of a Controlled Dangerous Substance.

Patrol Deputies have



responded to and investigated 44 thefts, 1 Robbery, and investigated 10 Burglaries. Deputies are equipped with many tools to assist them in processing the crime scene. Deputies have the ability to photograph the scene, collect fingerprints, and in some cases, collect DNA. Patrol Deputies work in connection with our Criminal Investigations Unit.

The Office of The Sheriff for Queen Anne's County has a Constitution Duty to the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's County. Sheriff Deputies to include the Patrol Deputies are assigned the duty of servicing the Civil Process Papers of the Courts. During this first quarter, the Patrol Unit has assisted the Sheriff's Courts and Civil

Process units by servicing 118 documents and completed 48 attempted services.

Patrol Deputies are equipped with Body Worn Cameras. These devices are used to gain your trust that our men and women that are behind the badge are adhering to the Agency Policies and Procedures. The body-worn camera also affords our Patrol Deputies the protection from false complaints against them. The Office of the Sheriff for Queen Anne's County has many different units that work a variety of different job functions. All work together to establish the mission of our Agency as a whole.

K9 UPDATE

Our agency K9 Division is part of the Field Operations Division (Patrol). We have four K9 deputies who are each assigned to a patrol squad. Cpl. Brad Martz and K9 Spike are assigned to shift group 4; Dfc. Chris Ahearn has two K9's, K9 Bella who is a Bloodhound and K9 Konar - assigned to shift group 3; Dfc. Piasecki and K9 Zora are assigned to shift group 2; Deputy Joe Patikowski and K9 Drake are assigned to shift group 1. We continue to assist patrol with calls for service.

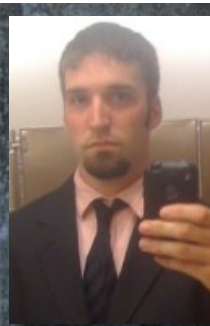

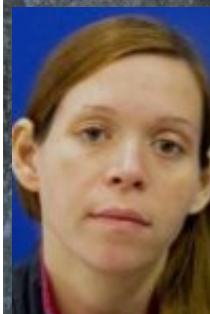
