The following is a list of activities that the Sheriff's Patrol unit has accomplished since January 1, 2019. Patrol Deputies completed a total of 5,864 calls for service to include traffic stops. These Deputies completed a total of 448 reports for multiple types of offenses. Sheriff's Patrol Deputies have completed 536 Radar assignments, 105 traffic enforcement, and totaling 1,883 traffic stops. Patrol Deputies have investigated 111 motor vehicle collisions on our County roadways. Speed is one of the County's number one complaints and Patrol is active with assisting to resolve these complaints.

Over the past year, drug usage has increased to higher levels to include the use of Heroin combined with Fentanyl. This deadly combination has caused our Patrol Units to respond to numerous overdoses

The Queen Anne's County Drug Task Force is a multi-agency task forced aimed at combating mid and upper level drug dealers in Queen

Anne's County, Maryland. The task force board is comprised of members of the Maryland State Police, Queen Anne's County Sheriff's Office, the Centreville Police Department, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources Police and the Office of the Queen Anne's County State's Attorney.

The Queen Anne's County Drug Task Force reports quarterly to the Task Force Advisory Board. The benefit of the Task Force concept is that it lessens the manpower and budgetary constraints on each participating agency.

the Maryland State Police have been very successful in charging those responsible for delivering opioids to multiple fatal and non-fatal overdoses. Queen Anne's County now has one of the highest success rates for achieving convictions in these cases.

Investigators with the task force also routinely work hand in hand with the CID units at the Queen Anne's County Sheriff's Office and the Maryland State Police to investigate thefts, robberies and crimes of violence that often have their roots in the use and sales of narcotics.

Support Services Division provides current trend's trainings

The Support Services Division is commanded by Lieutenant Mark Meil. Second in command is 1st Sergeant John Meyers. The division is comprised of several units and functions, including the Criminal Investigations Unit, Evidence and Property, the Drug Task Force, the Sheriff's Resource Unit, Training Unit, and the Auxiliary Unit. Each unit has unique law enforcement responsibilities and duties that differ from other divisions. Some of those duties include covert investigations, school safety and security, management of all property and evidence, law enforcement support, training, and criminal intelligence.

From a training perspective the Support Services Division has been extremely busy in • providing all school and county personnel, as well as commercial entities training on how to properly mitigate and or prevent • Active Assailant attacks. The training unit led by Lt. Meil has been extremely proactive in bringing high quality training to the members of the Office of the Sheriff as well. In house training / curriculum development has increased tremendously over the past year. To maximize availability of manpower the training unit has implemented E-Learning for personnel. This is to allow employees access to course of instruction 24 hours a day to maximize their time.

Some of the classes taught and or created this past year are as follows:

- MD SRO Course Lt. Meil assisted the Maryland Center for School Safety in the development and implementation of this course. Queen Anne's County was the first jurisdiction in the State of Maryland to receive the new Statewide Maryland School Resource Officer curriculum. This is a new requirement where SRO's will be required to update their skills every two years.
- NASRO The entire School Resource
 Officer Unit will be attending a week
 long National School Resource Officer •
 training course. Each employee will be
 certified Nationally as an SRO. This
 training is highly sought and difficult to
 obtain.
- Delmarva Gas & Electric Safety for LE –
 Lt. Meil partnered with the Delmarva

 Power Company to create this new course that provides much needed


- safety tips to First responders when dealing with gas and electric in the performance of their duties.
- LGIT Implicit Bias Lt. Meil was instrumental in bringing this training to Queen Anne's County. This training provides First responders the tools necessary to recognize Implicit bias and how to properly mitigate these behaviors.
- Vape for LE Lt. Meil developed and created a Vape familiarization course for Law Enforcement to provide deputies the tools necessary to properly investigate these types of complaints in school and in the community.
- **DNA training** Agency personnel are required annually to participate in DNA training.
- Narcan Lt. Meil developed and implemented the agency Narcan certification course provide employees with an easy to understand process to properly deploy the Narcan unit. In addition, Lt. Meil was instrumental in obtaining Narcan at no charge to the office to provide emplovees the much needed • equipment that has proven to save lives within the community.
- Active Assailant Training The training unit has provided countless hours of training in this area to all school employees, county employees, commercial entities, and agency personnel to properly respond to and mitigate these types of attacks.
- FEMA School Based Incidents Course This course was developed with the assistance of Federal partners to provide current training for all first responders to include DES, school administrators, and law enforcement on how to properly respond to, deal with, investigate, and close out a large scale school based incident / investigation.
- Handle with Care A new program will be implemented soon with the BOE and allied agencies to assist children who have been exposed to trauma. This program is scheduled to be launched next school year. All agency personnel will be receiving a newly created training course to provide an overview of this program.

- Agency in Service Training The training unit has again created an annual training package for agency personnel providing updated curriculum dealing with various topics of instruction.
- DNR Boat Training The training unit is in the process of coordinating with DNR police for boat training sessions to provide certification and operator experience for agency personnel with the agencies operational boat.
- Secret Service / False Document Training

 The training unit has coordinated with
 Federal partners to bring a False
 Document training course to agency
 personnel to provide employees the
 tools necessary to properly investigate a
 case involving various types of
 fraudulent documents.
- LGIT Training Database & Powerdms —
 the training unit has implemented two E
 -Learning training database options for
 agency personnel to take courses of
 instruction 24/7 365. This provides
 frequent accessibility to employees.
 They can access course 24 hours a day
 from these two databases.
- NTOA The training unit has partnered with the National Tactical Officers Association to bring high quality training to our agency personnel dealing with various areas of instruction.
- Body Camera 2 Transition The training unit will be in the process of transitioning all employees from the Axon Flex Body Camera to the new and improved Axon Body 2 Camera system. These new cameras will provide a much higher quality product to better assist personnel in the performance of their duties.



Meet the School Resource Officers



The Sheriff's Resource Unit (SRU) has several different responsibilities. Our primary responsibility is providing security our county schools. We work closely with the Board of Education, as well as the private schools in our county.

The unit is currently comprised of the following School Resource Officers (SROs):

Sergeant Jeremy Davidson – Unit Supervisor

Corporal John Brockman – Unit Assistant Supervisor, assigned to Matapeake Middle (Matapeake Middle School, Matapeake Elementary School and Grasonville Elementary)

Deputy First Class Andrew Neall – Assigned to Queen Anne's County High School (Centreville Middle School)

Deputy First Class Ryan Davidson – Assigned to Stevensville Middle School (Kent Island Elementary School and Bayside Elementary School)

Deputy First Class George Parker – Assigned to Sudlersville Middle School (Sudlersville Elementary School and Church Hill Elementary School)

Deputy First Class Patrick Matteson – Assigned to Kent Island High School (KIHS 9th grade Annex)

The SROs responsibilities include the safety and security of school students/staff in and around school campuses; responding to calls for service related to schools; and traffic direction / control during arrival and dismissal at the high schools.

Recently three Resource Unit personnel attended Maryland School Resource Officer Training provided by the Maryland Center for School Safety. This training has been established to equip SROs with necessary training and updates specific to school safety. The remainder of the unit will attend this training in the coming months.

In addition to protecting the county's schools, the Resource Unit is responsible for handling special events throughout the county. The vast majority of the special events in the county are held on the weekends and during the summer months.

So far in the year 2019 Resource Unit has covered four special events, with many more to come this calendar year. Additionally they have attended several meetings for major upcoming events and various committees and boards that we assist.




